May 3: Show Low Bluff Trail, 3 miles. Difficulty 2.0. Meet at the barn visible from Hwy. 260, 560 S. Rock Ridge Rd., Show Low, 7:45AM.

May 10: Country Club and Pat Mullins Trails. The CC Trail is a 3.5 mile relatively flat loop trail. Off the CC trail is the Pat Mullins Vista, a 1.0 mile up and back down trail that is optional. Difficulty 2.5. To ride share, meet in the parking lot near the W-Z Ramen-Hibachi Kitchen * at 7:45AM. Suggested ride-share \$2. Alternatively, meet us at the Country Club Trailhead at 8AM.

May 17: Old Hatchery and Springs Trails, 5 miles. Difficulty 2.0. Meet in the parking lot near the W-Z Ramen-Hibachi Kitchen* at 7:45AM. Suggested ride-share \$2. Alternatively, meet us at the Old Hatchery trailhead at AZ Game & Fish parking lot, Pinetop at 8AM.

May 24: Panorama Short Loop, 6 miles. Difficulty 2.5. Meet in the parking lot near the W-Z Ramen-Hibachi Kitchen* at 6:45AM. Suggested ride-share is \$3. Alternatively, meet us at the Panorama trailhead off Porter Mountain Rd. at 8AM.

May 31: Land of Pioneers Short Loop, 5 miles. Difficulty 2.5. Meet in the back parking lot of the Social Security office, 2500 E. Cooley, Show Low, 7:45AM. Suggested ride-share is \$5.

*W-Z Ramen-Hibachi Kitchen, 44 E White Mountain Blvd, Pinetop.

We care about your safety! Trail distances are not always exact, and the difficulty rating (on a scale of 1-5) is subjective. Please know your limitations and bring extra water and snacks and anything else you need for your safety and comfort. For more information about trails, including downloadable maps, click here to view TRACKS White Mountain Trail System. Per Apache Sitgreaves Forest regulations, dogs are allowed if they remain on a 6-foot or shorter leash. Hikers with dogs will be asked to walk at the back of the group to minimize tripping and other hazards. We try to carpool/rideshare to save gas and the planet, but you are welcome to drive your own vehicle to trailheads. All hikes are subject to change/cancellation based on weather and other circumstances beyond our control. **!**

APACHE-SITGREAVES NATIONAL FOREST Lakeside Ranger District News

The good news for the forest is that we are having winter this season! For the first time in a while fire, danger is low, and snow is high. The amount of snow on the Forest creates entirely different issues than when we don't have enough snow. Many roads on the Forest are closed due to heavy snow and others can be difficult to navigate. Make sure you check with local authorities such as local Forest Service Offices about local conditions and road conditions BEFORE you set out on your trip! Most Forest Service roads are not maintained and are now covered with snow and can be impassable during the winter. Also check current and forecast weather conditions before beginning your trip.

Knowledge of the area, weather, route, your physical limitations, and the condition and limitations of your equipment, vehicle, or snowmobile plus a little common sense can ensure a safe and enjoyable trip. Be sure to bring layers of warm clothing, waterproof outerwear, food, water, a way to communicate should you need help, first-aid kit, and survival gear should you get stranded. Remember to avoid muddy roads/trails as the snow melts to prevent resource damage.

Preparation and safety are of utmost importance while recreating in the National Forest. Please observe safety alerts and notices before your excursion to the Forest. Simply knowing the current conditions, closures and alerts prepares you for a pleasurable outdoor visit, free from any surprise that could deter your fun! Efforts have begun anew to start a Back Country Horsemen of America (BCHA) chapter in the White Mountains. An Organizational Meeting will be held April 15 at Noon, at the White Mountain Nature Center in Lakeside. All interested parties and their families are encouraged to attend.
